COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS

Students at NBTHS have the ability to study in cohorts in several academies: The NBTHS STEM Academy with pathways in Computer Science & Engineering, The NBTHS Business Academy (affiliated with the Rutgers RUBY program) with pathways in Marketing, Multimedia, & Finance, and The NBTHS Humanities Academy (launched in 2020). Additionally, we have an onsite College Connections Coordinator from Middlesex College who assists students with all aspects of college admissions including the enrollment of our students in credit-earning, college-level courses taught by the NBTHS faculty. We have run a successful AVID program for selected students in grades 9-12 since 2016.

COMMUNITY

North Brunswick Township (17th Legislative District; 12th Congressional District) covers 13.1 square miles in Middlesex County, NJ; it's a culturally diverse community of over 42,000 residents governed by the Honorable Francis "Mac" Womack and Town Council. It is rich in family traditions and takes great pride in the many cultures within its borders. Each year a Heritage Day Festival is held to celebrate the cultural diversity which enhances and enriches the community. North Brunswick is committed to education and provides its citizens with a wealth of community services. NBTHS is a pivotal facility, utilized twelve months a year, not only for education but for a myriad of activities for senior citizens, young children and a variety of community groups. FACILITY

NBTHS is located in central NJ between New York City and Philadelphia and a short drive away from Rutgers and Princeton universities. The school building and the campus reflect the community's commitment to a quality education for all of our youth. Our award-winning facility was designed as a community space on a 48-acre tract; the architectural layout and adjoining property service not only the high school but the entire township.

The school's design offers a variety of unique features such as:

- ★ A state-of-the-art auditorium, multi-media TV/Radio/Music studios and art wing
- ★ "Project Lead The Way" school: two CAD classrooms with adjoining engineering workshop with a 3D printer, CNC milling machine and a CNC router table
- ★ Two Dedicated Computer Science Labs & two Engineering & Construction labs. Each student is 1:1 and receives a district issued device.
- ★ An Olympic swimming pool and fitness center
- ★ Three gymnasiums—one of which accommodates 1900 people, renovated in 2016
- ★ Newly renovated athletic fields: Steve Libro Stadium, Stan Williston Field & Guido DiTorrice Field
- ★ A township park, athletic stadium, tennis courts and a multitude of athletic fields adjoining the campus

STUDENTS

NBTHS is an ethnically and economically diverse school. This diversity has enhanced our students' high school experience by increasing their tolerance, understanding and acceptance of others and by exposing them to the riches of a variety of cultures. FACULTY & STAFF

There are 230 professional staff members with more than 50% holding master's degrees or higher. The staff includes 8 School Counselors, a Substance Awareness Counselor, an on-site Child Study Team, Special Education "Transition Teachers", UBHC Clinicians, a College Coordinator, & 170 classroom teachers.

VARSITY ATHLETICS: HOME OF THE RAIDERS

NBTHS offers a total fifty-eight varsity, junior varsity, and freshman athletic programs. Boys' sports include: football, wrestling, basketball, tennis, cross-country, golf, soccer, swimming, baseball, lacrosse, bowling and winter/spring track. Girls' sports include: softball, basketball, tennis, soccer, swimming, cross-country, cheerleading, lacrosse, bowling, wrestling, flag football and winter/spring track. The Athletic Department has been awarded the Greater Middlesex Conference's Sportsmanship Award multiple times over the past few years.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES: HOME OF THE ROBOTICS TEAM WORLD CHAMPIONS

NBTHS offers close to 60 clubs and activities for our student body, which conduct dozens of events throughout the school year. Over half of our student population takes advantage of one or more of these opportunities, participating in groups that range from co-curricular to cultural to common interest or service-oriented groups. Prestigious awards have been bestowed on our music groups, Model UN Club, Yearbook, and Robotix, among others. The Student Government-run Homecoming Semi-Formal, in addition to the cultural celebrations of the Latin American Club, the Black Cultural Alliance, and the South Asian Cultural Association, have set attendance records in recent years. All students are encouraged to broaden their horizons and prepare for their future through club involvement.

STUDENT WELLNESS

Our students' social & emotional health is a top priority. We support our students' ever-evolving interests in pursuing post-high school plans that meet their unique personal and family needs. In recent years, many of our students are taking time off, some are staying closer to home, and more are choosing to start at smaller colleges because of high costs or other personal reasons. We find great success in this and celebrate when our students have made the best decisions for their futures based on their own circumstances, and not according to published rankings or reports. Our students make us smile; our Raider Pride is unmatched!

GRADING, GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA) & NUMERICAL EQUIVALENTS

It is the policy of the North Brunswick Township Board of Education that NBTHS will not report rank for admissions purposes. Rank information may be provided directly to a college or university for scholarship purposes after a student has been admitted. Our G.P.A. uses a 4.0=A scale. It is computed by multiplying the numerical grade equivalent times the credits for the course and then dividing by the total number of credits attempted. Advanced Placement (AP) courses earn a 1.0 point higher numerical grade equivalent; Honors courses earn a 0.5 point higher numerical grade equivalent. Letter grades & number values: A+=4.3 (98-100), A=4.0 (93-97), A-=3.6 (90-92), B+=3.3 (87-89), B=3.0 (83-86), B-=2.6 (80-82), C+=2.3 (77-79), C=2.0 (73-76), C-=1.6 (70-72), D=1.0 (65-69), F=0 (64.5 & below).

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible for graduation, every NBTHS student must successfully complete the following minimum course credit requirements:
